We serve an average of 3,000 people every month and our numbers are in for last year. There has been a 15% increase in visits, which underscores our mission and need for resources to maintain a supply of essential food.

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## **Food Rescue Partnerships**

Our Food Rescue partnerships are a vital part of our mission at Bonner Community
Food Bank. Five days a week, our van visits
 3 to 5 local grocery stores to pick up donated items—everything from fresh produce and meat to bread, dairy, and shelf-stable goods. These donations are safe, nutritious foods that have been pulled from shelves as they near their sell-by dates but are still perfectly good to eat.
With the help of our dedicated volunteers, we collect, inspect, and redistribute these items—keeping our Client Choice Market stocked and helping our neighbors access the healthy food they need.

This program is a true win-win-win for our community. It reduces food waste, supports local hunger relief, and provides grocery stores a sustainable way to give back. Our Food Rescue efforts result in hundreds of meals each week, and they've become one of our most reliable sources of perishable foods—so important for a balanced diet. We're grateful for the commitment of our partner grocers and the hard work of our staff and volunteers who make it all possible.

Working on the mission of overcoming food insecurity can be a heavy and carry difficult truths. We try to bring levity and playfulness in when we can.

Preparing for and hosting this special fundraiser is one of those unique times when we can. The concept was developed almost 40 years ago when an art teacher in Michigan found a way to engage his students in a charitable cause and raise awareness about hunger. Bowls were made and filled with a simple meal of soup. Diners enjoy a warm meal, then take the bowl home as a reminder of all the empty bowls around the world. The concept spread quickly, and this type of fundraiser is held in many variations across the nation. We are so grateful for our partnership with Sandpoint High School Art Department.
